Workshop Supply List

January 12, Goleta Community Center 9:00 AM - 3:30 PM

Double Wedding Ring

- 15" & 18" template rings from Flynn Quilt Frame Co.
 - (sets available at workshop for \$15 ea.)
- Sewing Machine with deck. (deck is very important)
- Pins, neutral thread
- Rotary Cutter with small wheel, cutting mat, ruler for use with rotary cutter

Wash & press all fabrics before class.

Background fabric: Traditionally white or muslin, but your may use anything you wish.

Arc Fabrics: Six fabrics make up the arcs. Best results are obtained using prints moderately contrasting in both color & value with enough variation in scale to make it interesting. Half yards or fat quarters work best. SIZES/SHAPE OF THESE 6 FABRIC PIECES SHOULD BE CONSISTENT.

The Corners: Choose two fabrics which are compatible with your arc fabrics. If there is too much contrast, the corners will dominate. ENROLL: See Anne Braddock to pay for class and get Fabric Chart to figure yardage. Phone 687-4228


Membership dues

A free demo version of VQuilt, a new MS/DOS program for quilt construction is available for ftp transfer. Transferring this program onto your hard disk from Internet will enable you to design blocks, paint (if you have a color monitor), rotate, flip, incorporate into quilts and much more. The demo is fully functional with the exception that you can neither save work to disk nor print output. Information on how to download this program onto your PC can be found in the Quilting on the Computer binder in our Guild Library.

A free demo version of PCQuilt for the Mac is available at several ftp sites. It's the same as the commercial version, except that printing & saving have been disabled. The ftp locations are:

A Review... Guys Who Sew

UC Santa Barbara Art Gallery's recent show of wall hangings, sculpture, needlepoint (kits) weaving and book was sewn by men and classified as fine art, irrespective of the generally poor quality and simplistic vision. Stop right here.... Don't get me wrong, my disappointment in the show is not a sexist issue... men vs. women who sew. Rather, it was an insult to the men and women who seriously sew as artistic expression! The main issues of contention surround gallery space and the financial support given to bad taste, bad art and poor workmanship. In my view, a poor show, in a town where gallery space is limited, set back the possibility for truly fine sewing to be displayed locally. Even the curators confessed the show was a direct response to the plethora of recent local exhibits featuring women artists. Given that mandate, perhaps they considered it unimportant to search for the best examples of sewing by men in quilting, costuming, clothing, sculpture and wall hangings. Also disappointing was the Nov 12 panel discussion. A panel of artists, the curators and an art critic, denigrated the term "craftsmanship". They implied that sewing kept women in their place and that sewing in the 1970's was beneath contempt as ... "derivative, poor folk art." Excuse me, since when does good workmanship, i.e. craftsmanship, exist in opposition to art? Prior to the industrial revolution all fine art and crafted objects were handmade. Master craftsman held an esteemed place in society alongside fine artists.

I believe it is even more important now to support the guild quilt show in '95. We need to show our community that sewing by men and women can be finely crafted and, indeed, fine art! We know this, but it is not enough since the art community has had little exposure to fine sewing and quilting. It is our responsibility educate them for a change.



Quilt Liquidation on TV

Did anyone see that show on TV, Friday, Dec 9th? There were many quilts, about 200 or so, being liquidated from a Mid-West collection. Each quilt was show, the size and brief description given. The Dealer mentioned the approximate age and drew attention to any wear, fading or other problems. Most of the quilts were in prime condition and well taken care of. The age of the quilts was mid-1800's to the late 1950's....certainly a collectable range. The best part of the excellent collection was the price range...\$199 to \$1299, but most ranged about \$250 to \$400. Each quilt was one of a kind and an 800 phone number was provided for the viewer. The show was aired only in a few towns in Southern California. The Dealer offered to accept return of any of the quilts if not satisfied. The show will be aired again, Friday, December 16 on Channel 8 at about 8:00 PM. It was fun to see these antiques!

California Heritage Quilt Project

The California Heritage Quilt Project has entered a new phase. They have begun oral interviews of California quilters, especially the older quilters and people who were involved in the revival of quilting in the 60's and 70's. To start this new phase, the Project Board Members had several intensive training session and now would like to encourage as many quilters as possible to have some initial professional training in doing Oral Interviews. Last January 45 persons attended a training session sponsored by the CHQP and taught by Laurel Horton, folklorist and quilt historian from South Carolina.

The Project is offering a weekend seminar on Saturday and Sunday, January 14 & 15 at the Ramada Inn in Santa Ana and again on January 21 & 22 at the Ramada Inn in South San Francisco. The cost of the seminar is \$138. This intensive weekend seminar will again be taught by Laurel Horton, whose course was so interesting a effective last year.

The Project would like the guilds and interviewers to keep a copy of the interviews for their own use such as stories for newsletters, human interest stories in local newspapers, etc.

When piecing dark fabric to light fabric, press seam towards the dark. If this is not possible and both seams need to be pressed toward the light side, trim a very tiny strip away from the dark seam allowance. This will help keep threads on the dark seam edge from showing through from underneath the light fabric.

December Block-of-the-Month

?What? would be the most outrageous thing you could do at a Quilt Show? No not that!!!!! Do the forbidden and touch a quilt. Think of all the quilts you wanted to touch in order to see how the technique was done. Well...we are going to provide that opportunity at our 1995 Quilt Show and we want as many of our members to

participate as possible. Here is how:

Make a block that is 8" finished (8 1/2" with seams)

Fabric to use: a)black & white prints

with

b) color solids

You can do anything you want, but the block should be as inviting to touch as possible. Here are some ideas:

-Trapunto

-The reverse side, swirl center of an 8 pointed star.

-Machine gathered material

-Different batts

-3 dimensional appliqué or piecing

-soft tear appliqué, with rough edges and threads still hanging

-machine appliqué, with hem stitch

-anything you would see at "Visions"

-stippling

-novelty & specialty fiber techniques e.g. rick-rack flowers

-anything you can think of

If you don't want to make a block but want to participate: Trace a hand (yours. a child's hand. or a hand reaching to touch something) on freezer paper and iron it to one of the two types of fabrics mentioned. Cut with a seam allowance and baste raw edges so that it will be ready to appliqué to the quilt. One hand is equivalent to one block

Don't stop at these ideas. The sky is the limit, you only have to touch it.

If you have any questions call Judy Gorrindo at 682-6592. Bring the blocks to the January meeting.

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The Venerable Pot Holder

If you use up your extra quilt blocks for potholders
be aware that polyester/synthetic batting tends
to melt in high heat. Polyesters and regular
cotton batting does not provide enough protection
from heat. Better choices for batting can be found
from materials you might recycle around the
house.

- * Table Felt (not regular felt) washed and dried twice in the dryer to make it shrink to thickness
- * A few layers or old cotton mattress pads or old ironing board pad
- * Several layers of woven wool, or wool blanket
- * Cotton sweatshirt material
 - * Recycle an old cotton thermal blanket
- As for the "hot side" of your potholder, tefloncoated fabric often sold as ironing board cover material works nicely.

Amounts for ingredients to be determined by the size of your hungry crowd.

Bow Tie Pasta

Sundried Tomatoes, chopped into small pieces

(bottled, sun dried tomatoes in oil)

Fresh parsley, chopped

Green Onion tops, chopped fine

Pine Nuts

Freshly grated Parmesan Cheese

- Marinated artichoke hearts, chopped Olive Oil
- A splash of Basalmic Vinegar Salt & Pepper to taste
- Prepare the bow tie pasta and let cool to room temperature. While cooling, roast the pine nuts by placing in an open pan, shaking occasionally.

Cranberry Lemon Bread

4 Tbs. butter or margarine 3/4 cups sugar

2 eggs

2 tsps. grated lemon peel 2 cups white flour, sifted

21/2 tsps. baking powder

1 tsp. salt

3/4 cup milk

2 cups fresh cranberries, chopped

1/2 cup mixed candied fruits and peels, chopped

1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Glaze:

2 tsps. lemon juice

2 Tbs. sugar

Cream together butter and 3/4 cup sugar till light & fluffy. Add eggs, lemon peel, beat well. Sift together dry ingredients and add to creamed mixture alternately with milk, beating till smooth after each addition. Stir in cranberries, mixed fruits/peel and nuts. Pour into 9x5x3 inch pan, bake at 350 degrees F. for 55-65 minutes or until done. Let cool 10 minutes and remove from pan. When bread is completely cool, combine lemon juice and 2 Tbs. sugar, spoon over top. Serve with a spread of softened cream cheese mixed with 1 Tbs. lemon rind.


