In 1991, I started teaching adult ed classes myself and I have had the best students! They keep me excited about the power of quilts to do so many things. I helped organize the making of the Museum Impressions quilt in 1990-91, served as program chair for two years and co-chaired the guild's two juried shows.

I went to art school in Rhode Island. I am a graphic designer by training and especially like publishing, but I gave it up (unintentionally) to raise my two children, Gavin now 16 and Anne, now 13. My husband Bob's many job-related moves from one side of the country to the other, didn't help my graphics career either.

I suppose my other interests are photography, travel(sightseeing, really), and writing (letters to the editor, articles, letters to friends.) At one time in my life, I did a lot of work with international students and wives and was a hospice volunteer.



Unfettered Hearts

For February, let's improvise to our heart's content! Below you'll find 4 different sizes of hearts to applique in pinks or reds onto an off-white or beige 8 1/2" background square. For those of you that aren't applique fans, remember that satin stitching on your machine is also an option. Organize as many (or few) of these hearts as you like on the background in any way that pleases you, remembering to leave the 1/4" seam allowance around the edge. Embellishments are always nice (a bit of lace, some buttons....) Let your heart be your guide!
