SUPPLY LIST FOR THE SEPTEMBER WORKSHOP WITH PRISKA

PRISKA ANNAHEIM will teach a unique Log Cabin. Uneven strips are sewn together into different squares. Then the blocks are cut into four parts. Lastly we mix all the parts to create a new design. (you know how we hate doing the same old thing!) She will teach us how to finish the quilt with uneven borders and bindings. And lastly she will give her hints for perfect machine quilting.

FABRIC: 1 yard fabric for border (optional)

Four 1/4 yard cuts of dark fabric Four 1/4 yard cuts of medium fabrics Four 1/4 yard cuts of light fabrics SEWING TOOLS: Sewing machine, Rotary cutter, mat and ruler (6"X12") Thread to match fabric Seam ripper, pins and general sewing supplies.

Monday, June 9 Dear Coastal Quilters,





A MARRIAGE OF BLOCKS

CREATING WONDERFUL NEW TRADITIONAL DESIGNS WITH BEAUTIFUL BLENDS, MERGES, & EXPLOSIONS

This workshop gives you the opportunity to experiment with traditional block patterns in several exciting ways. I look forward to working and sharing my ideas with you. It is my hope you will have a multitude of design ideas swimming in your mind for future quilts by the time this workshop is over.

PLEASE BRING THE FOLLOWING ITEMS:

Several large sheets of drawing paper (plain white paper; approx. 13" x 17"). ruler (18-24 inches), paper scissors, eraser, correction fluid, scotch tape, pencil, pen, glue stick (removable type is preferable), and masking tape
Optional: color pencils, small cutting board and rotary cutter, lunch sack or small paper bag for cuttings

Make copies (13-15 each) of four different patterns from one of the following patch-pattern families: (a) the nine-patch pattern family; (b) the four-patch pattern family; (c) the five-patch pattern family; or (d) the seven-patch pattern family. The block copies must be the same size for all four patterns. They should be large enough for easy cutting and repositioning, yet small enough to incorporate many blocks on one sheet of paper (2" - 3" recommended size).

Hint: Choose block patterns that are not similar in their designs. For instance, you might bring one that appears quite complete within its block format (e.g. a star design) while another appears as if more block are needed to clarify or create its design. Try to bring block patterns that use different types of shapes.

Please note: If you do not know what patch-pattern patterns are, or you are so stressed you do not have time to make copies, do not fear. I, too, will be bringing pattern copies of my own for you to use.

Optional: A 12-inch drafting triangle is an important tool for drawing patterns, which we will do in class. A drafting triangle may be found at an architectural/art supply store. A colored one is best (e.g. orange, chartreuse). It can be either 45-45-90 degrees or 30-60-90 degrees.

Other optional suggestions: To increase your understanding of block play, if possible, read Patchwork Persuasion---Fascinating Quilts from Traditional Designs, particularly Chapters 1-3. Also, you may like to view exciting block blends on pages 106 ñ134 in Make Any Block Any Size. If you are interested in increasing your understanding of the visual qualities of a quiltis design, read The Visual Dance---Creating Spectacular Quilts, particularly Chapters 1-6, and Chapter 9.


LIGHTING UP YOUR QUILTS

This class will include slide presentations, discussion, and exercises. After a color foundation is presented, the popular color illusions of luminosity, luster, shadows, and highlights will be introduced. As time permits, other light illusions may be presented, such as transparency, iridescence, and opalescence.

PLEASE BRING THE FOLLOWING:

- I. ruler, eraser, pencil, glue stick (prefer removable), paper scissors, fabric scissors and/or rotary cutter and mat, masking tape, and several sheets of large drawing paper (plain white paper); optional: color pencils, if you have them
- II. fabrics from your collection with the following characteristics (bring as whole pieces---do not cut up):
- a. several fabrics from two or three color families that range from very light tovery dark in value (such as light pink, pink, red, dark red, maroon).
- b. several fabrics from the same selected color families, which show different degrees of intensity, ranging from the purest (such as the most brilliant or most intense red) to the most toned fabrics (such as a grayed-down or toned red, such as rose).
- c. a few fabrics from your chosen color families that are both blurred in pattern and grayed-down (toned) in coloring.
- d. other fabrics that can be placed in the following categories: (1) pure colors (e.g. orange, violet, turquoise, yellow); (2) tints (e.g. apricot, lavender, robin's egg blue, cream); (3) shades (e.g. rust or brown; dark violet, dark turquoise, avocado); and (4) tones (e.g. salmon, grayed violet, grayed teal; beige).
- e. Bring a few additional fabrics from your selected color families.

Although you might feel compelled to bring a suitcase of fabrics, it is not necessary to do so. Bring an amount, which is both easy for you to transport and will give you options with which to work.




The Guild has been invited to make Christmas stockings for



Quilts and Quiltmaking in America now available on American Memory

Quilts and Quiltmaking in America showcases materials from two American Folklife Center collections, the Blue Ridge Parkway

Folklife Project Collection (1978) and the "All-American Quilt Contest" sponsored by Coming Home, a division of Lands' End. and Good Housekeepina. Together collections provide glimpse America's diverse quilting traditions. The quilt documentation from the Blue Ridge Parkway Folklife Project, an ethnographic field project conducted by the American Folklife Center in cooperation with the National Park Service, includes photographs and 181 recorded interviews with six quiltmakers in Appalachian North Carolina and Virginia. These materials document quilts and quilting within the context of daily life and reflect a range of backgrounds, motivations, and aesthetic sensibilities. The materials presented from the Lands' End All-American Quilt collection Contest include images approximately 180 winning quilts from across the United States. The collection represents a wide range of quiltmaking, from highly traditional to innovative, and the quilts pictured exhibit excellent design and technical skill in a variety of styles and materials.

We have a generous donor to recognize each quarter of the year: That Patchwork Place, owned by Martingale & Co, of Washington State. I have written to thank them for the following new titles:

Two Color Quilts by Nancy J. Martin. Red and white and blue quilts have always been favorites, partly because they are so striking and often because there is plenty of white space for hand quilting. There are 20 traditional designs in this book with clear instructions to make these crisp and clean-looking quilts. Did you know that Nancy Martin is the founder and president of Martingale & Co? No wonder their books are so inspiring coming from a real quilter and sought-after teacher.

Folk Art Animals by Janet Carija Brandt should speak to those of you looking for animal designs. There are 25 applique animals here with many suggestions for use and an alphabet and even proverbs suggested for the borders. Quilts, pillows, pin cushions, wall hangings, and wool and felt techniques are included.

101 Fabulous Rotary-Cut Quilts by Judy Hopkins and Nancy J. Martin. As you can imagine this is a thick book, a colorful book with clear instructions. What else would you expect from these two best-selling authors? The quintessential book for rotary-cutting fans.

One other new book this month comes from last month's speaker, Lura Schwartz Smith. Anyone who has a goat will identify with The Cradle That Grandpa Built. It has full-sized patterns for a baby's quilt that illustrates this children's tale of a goat's mischief.

Block of the Month – October

Chrysanthemum Unfinished size: 101/2"

The chrysanthemum is associated with Fall & with Asian cultures. You can use some of those beautiful new Japanese fabrics to applique this stylized flower.

2 IR ZR

Materials:

Use a **Japanese print** for the blades of the flower. Select from yellow, gold, rust, red, orange, brown, taupe, or any combination of these. It will be especially effective with printed gold highlights.

Use a **black** print or solid for the **background**.


Directions:

Trace pattern pieces onto template material.


Transfer pattern outline onto fabric using **templates**. Note that pieces #1 & #2 also use the reverse of the pattern pieces.

Cut out pieces, include 3/16" - 1/4" seam allowance for turn under. Cut background fabric to 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ square.

Arrange applique elements into corner on background. Applique by hand or machine, starting with piece #1 & #1 reverse, add #2 & #2r, top with#3, and finish with #4.
