

Upcoming Programs

In May we are pleased to be bringing back **Katie Pasquini**. This very popular teacher is returning to present her *Ghost Layers* workshop. Using value changes and paints, she has pioneered the art of attaining depth and shading in quilts. This technique has application to both "art" and traditional quilts and will have everyone thinking of form in a whole new way. This workshop is filling up fast, so hurry! There is an \$11 workshop fee, in addition to the guild workshop fee.

In June we return to traditional work, with a bit of a twist. **Marti Michelle** will be here to share her cutting, sewing and quilting tips and techniques with us. If you recently caught her show on "Simply Quilts" you know she is a treasure trove of quick tips and ways to work more efficiently. Her knowledge and teaching experience will be useful to all quilters no matter what style you prefer to work in. We will be having her teach a *Quilt As You Sew* class. You will be able to learn easy finishing tricks, how to keep the units a manageable size and some of her new machine finishing techniques from her latest book. I do not have a materials list for this class yet, but will by guild time.



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Challenge Quilt

October may not be just around the corner, but it is not too soon to begin planning your CHALLENGE QUILT. MUSIC is the theme this year, and you are free to interpret it in any way you choose as long as your work meets the classic definition of a quilt (three layers held together by hand or machine stitching,) and is no more than 120" around. Need inspiration? Pick a color—yellow, for example—and see what comes to mind. *Yellow Rose of Texas, Follow the Yellow Brick Road, Tie a Yellow Ribbon 'Round the Old Oak Tree, Mellow Yellow, Yellow Bird, and Yellow Submarine* came quickly to me and offer interesting possibilities. If you haven't participated in a Challenge before, make this year your first and get in on the fun! If you have questions, call Barbara Franklin or Oleta Bennett.



Supply List for April

PICTORIAL QUILTING - A DESIGN WORKSHOP

- Bring those vacation photos, magazine pictures etc. that you wish you could turn into a quilt.
- Reduce photos on a copy machine to a 4x4 inch size.
- Butcher or freezer paper, 4x4 feet for drawing on.
- One large sheet of tracing paper.
- Pencil.
- Paper scissors.
- Fabrics you are considering for your project.

This workshop will focus on basic design principles for developing a composition.

Ideas for enlarging this composition **without a lot of drawing** will be presented.

The Course will cover:

- Tackling major characters or focal areas
- Secondary characters or landscape accents
- Auditioning borders
- Quilting the Pictorial Quilt
- Individual design time for each student
- Construction plan - brief discussion of techniques and how to use them in your quilt
- Fabrics appropriate for pictorial project

Description and Supply List for May

Ghost Layers and Color Washes with Katie Pasquini Masopust

1. Take a pattern, traditional or an original, for the base design.
2. Add a Ghost layer or floating design, (transparency) complimentary or in opposition to the first layer.
3. Add additional colors by following a painted water color wash (a painting on paper)

These three layers combined will create an in-depth and illusionary design. A small quilt sample will be created.


What to Bring:

Katie Pasquini will supply the paper products needed for a materials fee of 11.00.

2" brush and 3" foam brush (art supply or hardware store)
a small plate, (can be foam meat trays or white picnic plates)
container for water
3 small tubes of water color paint from these colors (choose 3): red, yellow, orange, blue, green and purple
3 colored pencils to match the colors you choose.
Pencil for drawing
pencils for marking on fabric
ruler
compass
fabric and paper scissors
rags and/or paper towels
tape
washcloth
spray starch
iron and ironing surface
extension cords
standard stapler that opens up flat and lots of extra staples.



Fabrics in the colors you want to use, (3 different colors that match the 3 tubes of paint you have chosen for the water color layer) sorted into 7 different values of each. Make separate piles of each of the steps, step 1 being white and very pale shades of the color, step 2 being a little darker, on through all of the steps to step 7 which will be black and very dark shades of the color. Have several pieces in each of the steps for each of the different colors you choose to work with. That would be a minimum of 3 in each step times 7 steps for at least 21 different pieces for each of the different colors times 3 different colors for at least 63 fabrics. The more fabrics you have to choose from the easier it will be. You will not need very much of any one color-fat eighths or thirds of a yard should be enough. Keep these in the separate steps by putting a paper spacer between them in a shoe box or transport them in zip lock bags. Sorting is the most time consuming, so please bring your fabrics sorted and Katie will help fine tune the steps in class. If you like working with black and white prints bring them in the seven steps as well.



When I was a child, we celebrated the first of May by making paper baskets and filling them with flowers. We hung the baskets filled with flowers on our neighbor's door, rang the doorbell, and ran for cover. I'm not sure when this delightful celebration became extinct but I thought we might celebrate the day once again by making a basket block and filling it with our favorite floral fabric.

May Block of the Month

May Basket Block

Finished Block Size: 10"
Unfinished Block Size: 10-1/2"

Fabric Selection:

Background: White or white on white
Basket: Any solid color you prefer
Fill your basket with your favorite floral

Cutting:

- From white cut: four 3" squares; two 2-1/2" x 6-1/2" rectangles, and one 4-3/4" square which you will cut corner to corner = two triangles.
- From solid cut: one 6-3/4" square and one 2-3/4" square both are cut corner to corner = triangles.
- From floral cut:
- one 6-3/4" square which you will cut corner to corner = two triangles, and four 3" squares

Assembly:

This block requires seven 2-1/2" half-square triangles each made from one 3" white background square and one 3" floral square. Put the 3" squares, right sides together, line drawn from corner to corner and sew 1/4" on either side of the line. Cut apart on the solid drawn line. Trim half-square triangles to measure 2-1/2" square.

Note the direction of triangles when sewing three half-square triangles together to make a unit and four half-square triangles together to make another unit. Sew the three half-square triangle unit to the left edge of the large floral triangle. Sew the four half-square triangle unit to the top of the large floral triangle. Sew the large solid triangle (basket) to the lower edge of the floral unit. Prepare side units by sewing a small solid triangle to the end of each of the white rectangles (note the direction of the triangles). Sew a rectangle unit to each side of block. To finish the block sew on the remaining 4-3/4" white triangle to make the lower right corner of the block.


