This month brings Cathy Van Bruggen from Garden Grove, California. Cathy says, "I began sewing at a very early age. I remember sewing doll clothes by hand while watching my mother create costumes. Later, I was hired by Catalina Swimwear as a production manager and sample maker. Unable to work outside the home while raising five children, I designed custom bridal wear. In 1970, we developed a family business called The Outfitters, a retail chain for women's clothing. When I retired in 1995, I began quilting as a hobby. By using timesaving techniques in quilt making, I developed <u>Appliqué the Easy Way</u>. I enjoy creating botanically correct appliqué featuring flowers, birds, and woodland creatures. My workshops feature all my original designs and published patterns.

October 12 Lecture: Cathy Van Bruggen presents **All About Appliqué:** This program includes a brief history of appliqué and a trunk show of appliqué quilts. A variety of techniques will be shown to inspire your members to learn to *Appliqué the Easy Way*.

October 13 Workshop: Cathy Van Bruggen will teach her appliqué workshop entitled **Autumn**. It features a squirrel and field mouse admiring nature's beauty. Learn basic hand appliqué and learn advanced techniques such as reverse appliqué and embroidery to make your wall quilt realistic.

The giving for no other reason than that we will help someone in need—and because we can give of our own special skills, and from our hearts, we bring joy to ourselves as well as the person receiving our gift. Cathy Van Bruggen Appliqué the Easy Way - *Autumn* October 13, 2006

"Autumn" is the second quilt in the *Season* series. It features a squirrel and field mouse admiring nature's beauty. Learn how to **APPLIQUÉ THE EASY WAY** and get realistic results for this pictorial quilt. What a wonderful opportunity to use those gorgeous fall fabrics!

Fabric and Supplies;

3/4 yd background material

1 yard border

1 yard backing and sleeve

1/4 yard binding

1/2 yard light- weight interfacing for overlay

30" square of batting

Tree branches and log: 1 fat quarter of wood grain print

Assortment of scraps for appliqué:

- Squirrel shadow: dark brown
- Maple and oak leaves: variety of light, medium and dark
- Acorns: beige and brown
- Squirrel: light, medium and dark fur-like fabric
- Mouse: medium fur-like fabric, different than squirrel
- Moth: printed fabric moth. 3/4" x 6" strip beige fabric

Embellishments:

Perle cotton #12 in assorted greens, rust, gold and brown

Rayon DMC floss: light, medium and dark shades of brown and gold

DMC floss: white, brown Metallic silver thread

Sewing Supplies;

Basic sewing supplies Fine pins Needles (straw #10, embroidery needles #10) Mechanical pencil Water-soluble marking pen Paper and small sewing scissors Freezer paper Thread to match all appliqués

Sewing Machines are NOT needed for this workshop.

Supply List:

- Fabric: solids, hand dyes, batiks and tone on tones which read as solid, faint prints are OK (large & small). Make sure you have a good selection of lights, darks and mediums. You will be making about a fat quarter sized piece, so fat quarters and scraps are OK. We will be collaging the backgrounds
- Scissors for fabric and paper
- Perle Cotton size 5 in a variety of colors
- Doll needles (long, about 3 inches with a nice sized eye to get the perle cotton through)
- Optional: leather thimble or Needle Grabbers™
- An inexpensive one inch diameter size stencil brush (these are available at JoAnn's or Michael's)
- Cup for water to rinse out your brush
- White foam paper plate for a palette (I will bring some, if you bring the wrong kind)
- A roll of paper towels.
- Freezer paper (at least 1 yard) to protect the table and masking tape to hold it in place.
- Heavy sketch paper, at least the weight of light card stock.
- Pencil and ruler
- 1/2 yard of Tartalan or Crinoline (I will have the correct weight Tartalan available in class for \$5 per yard and in fat quarters at \$1.25.)
- Paints for stenciling: (Make sure your colors include black and white.)
- A small tube size set of acrylics

OR

- a good collection of colors of Shiva Oil Paintstiks[™] (bring extra freezer paper for a palette)
- OR
- Jacquard or Pebeo Setacolor Opaque paints in a number of colors

Please note that the Guild will provide paints for this workshop.



Bus Trip to Pacific International Quilt Show

Santa Barbara Air Bus has made arrangements for a 2-day bus trip to Santa Clara for the Pacific International Show on Saturday and Sunday, October 14-15. The cost is \$166 for double occupancy and \$231 for a single. This price includes overnight accommodations at the Hilton-Santa Clara (across from the show), transportation, baggage, and Saturday-Sunday admission. The bus will leave Santa Barbara at approximately 6 AM on Saturday, October 14 and return Sunday, October 15 at about 10 PM. A \$100 deposit is required at time of sign-up.

This is the largest quilt show on the west coast with hundreds of quilts on display. The vendor mall features over 150 booths with everything you need for your quilt projects.



This is a secret, so we'll need to be discrete when giving our blocks to Marilyn Martin or Joann Conklin.

Please join in and create one of these blocks to show our appreciation for the fine job Betty has done as president of our Guild for the past two years. This block was demonstrated by Mary Ellen Hopkins on <u>Simply Quilts</u> and adapts well to a group endeavor. The method she uses to make the triangles makes it extremely easy. We all have our own individual quarter inch seams, and this block eliminates any outside points, so they may be trimmed to make all the blocks uniform. She calls this block Mississippi, but another name for it is friendship star, which seems particularly appropriate to recognize Betty for a job well done!

This is a nine patch block. The basic instructions are to cut <u>one</u> 2 ½" block of a good quality muslin to be used as the center block. (See HINT below) Also cut <u>eight</u> more $2 \frac{1/2}{2}$ blocks of a variety of dark to medium jewel toned fabrics (red, blue, green, purple, hot pink, and turquoise, for example.) Just mix them up and arrange them to please your eye. You will probably have more than one of some colors--just mix up the fabric patterns, no two alike, and they will look great. Now, cut four additional $1 \frac{1}{2}$ squares of muslin to create the triangles. Draw a line across the diagonal and sew them to the center side squares of the nine patch. See illustration below.



Press the small triangle of muslin back to the corner of your 2 ½" inch square and trim to approximately ¼" only the middle piece of muslin leaving the 2 ½" square intact. Now sew the squares together in rows, pressing the seams in row 1 and 3 to the outside and row 2 toward the center block. The center block is 2" finished so it will accommodate your signature and any <u>brief</u> message you would care to include. Be sure to use a permanent marker such as a Pigma pen or a Sharpie ultra fine point.

<u>HINT</u>: If you cut a square of freezer paper and iron it to the back of the muslin square <u>before you make the block</u>, it will stabilize the fabric making it easier to write. Remove the freezer paper before you sew the squares together.

For you super achievers, you may turn in your blocks to Marilyn or Joann at the October meeting.


The rest of us should be able to have them ready to turn in by the <u>November</u> meeting.


