Port of Call	YOUR CHOICE
Language Skills	Must contain at least ONE word not part of a commercial fabric
Standard Baggage	Standard construction consisting of three layers, quilted
Longest Round Trip	100 inches "circumnavigation" (Smaller "jaunts" are OK, too!)
Baggage ID	A label with the quilt title and your name
One Carry-On	A 4-inch hanging sleeve
Valid Passport	A completed entry form; limited to one entry per member

I know I mentioned a great storage system for fabric last year, and I found another one that is pretty nice as well. Fons & Porter has a very attractive series of storage boxes for fat quarters in particular, but I am sure other sizes of fabric will work as well. Plus they have a wonderful Block Box. Around The Block: This Month's (appropriately!) Featured Group: "The Blockheads"

The Blockheads have been around for quite some time, but its present members include Isabel Downs (currently our head "Blockie"), Ranell Hansen, Leslie Hogan, Marcia Moore, Jean Phillips, Marlene Pearson, Kathy Rose, Judy Rys, and Gail Tinsley. In the past few months we've lost some members to attrition, so we've recently adopted four "new kids in our Block": Marie Butcher, Diane Eardley, Pam Holst and Nancy King. Originally the group was primarily comprised of women who worked full-time in salaried employment, but the percentage now is fairly evenly divided with full- and part-timers and newly "retired".

The Blockheads meet monthly, on the third Saturday of each month, at the Goleta Valley Community Center, pooling their "dues" to cover the cost of renting the same room used during the Guild workshops. Over the past couple of years they've decided to cut down on their monthly "quilting days", to make room for two "social" get-togethers at a member's home: Once during the summer for a potluck picnic, with lots of good food (and wine!), great conversation, and a "Show & Tell" time; and again in Decem-

ber for more of the same, including a fabric "gift" exchange (two yards of fabric, wrapped) and, for those who wish to participate, revealing their quilt challenge "exchanges" (more about these later). Some very big quilt shows always fall on the third "weekends", so we've recently decided to eliminate "working" get-togethers in January (to allow attendance at Road to California) and in October (to allow attendance at Pacific International Quilt Fest in Santa Clara).

A while ago... in fact, during two back-to-back years... the Blockheads made quilts that were raffled off during Guild meetings, with the "proceeds" benefiting the Domestic Violence

Women's Shelter in Santa Barbara. If you've been a Guild member for some time, you may recall the infamous "Panty Raid" and "Sock Hop" raffles. Instead of money-driven raffles, each ticket sold was "purchased" with a donation of a pair of new panties (in the second raffle it was socks). The clothing items were delivered to the shelter, for the benefit of women and children who possibly left their abusive home situations with few or no possessions, while the "winning ticket holder" received a beautiful afghan-sized quilt. These were two very cleverly structured raffles indeed!

The Blockheads have generally come up with a yearly "challenge" or "exchange" among those of the group who wish to partici-

pate. In past years, these have included black & white 4-patches, warm or cool half-square triangle patches, and Seminole pieced strips. The Seminole exchanges were fun, and here's how they worked: Each participant chose a focus fabric and provided a small sample swatch to EACH of the other participants. Each participant also received a SINGLE Seminole strip pattern; from that pattern, they were to make ONE (1) pieced strip for EACH participant, based upon the individual focus fabric samples of each participant. This got very creative, especially if you tried to only use fabric from your existing stash! At the December holiday potluck, a shopping bag was provided with each participant's name on it, into which each participant distributed the strips they had made for each recipient. For the big reveal, a bag was chosen (one at a time) and the strips removed and placed on the floor. It was amazing to see the variety achieved for each participant, who could then go home and assemble a new quilt... with most of the strips already constructed for her!

Last year's "challenge exchange" headed into an entirely new direction. Each participant was required to provide a photograph, drawing or quotation that they liked or found inspiring, placed in a sealed envelope. The "inspiration piece" could be ANYTHING, so that's what made it fun, as well as challenging! Each participant chose a sealed envelope, and was then required to make a "smallish" quilt inspired by that item, all the while keeping in mind that the person who brought the ORIGINAL inspiration piece would be the "keeper" of the finished product! The Blockheads shared those finished pieces at the March Guild meeting during Show & Tell. This latest "challenge exchange" turned out to be so much fun that they've decided to do it again for 2009! Maybe they'll share those results next year!

This new feature to our newsletter is envisioned as a venue to inform Guild members a bit more about our individual satellite groups and what activities they are involved in. For example: Group challenges or exchange ideas, interesting places they've been to or "Road Trips" they've taken, or worthwhile causes they contribute to. Each column will feature a different satellite group, and a digital photo or two may also be included if space permits. Block of the Month for May

Block of the Month—Arcs or Curves

The theme for this year's blocks is Geometrics. Each month will feature a different geometric shape. There are simple and consistent guidelines for the entire year, so you can stock up on fabric and use your creativity in the pattern, design and size you choose.

The shape for May is **ARCS** or **CURVES**: Here's where you let your curvy sense of design fly. Ovals, circles, curved lines, simple arcs.... Do an Arc de Triomphe block and use it for the Challenge travel poster; do a rainbow design; take a leaf from Ranell's quilts and do a curvy woman; or how about the Arches National Park? And you'll get extra credit (and a free fat quarter from me) if you design a block with Pierre Bézier in it (he patented the beziér curve – but you knew that already, right?). Did you know that there's a new Blackberry out there called the Curve? If you Google arc and curve on its Images site, you'll get all kinds of weird ideas! Check out this website: <http://mathforum.org/~sanders/connectinggeometry/Quilt.html>

...and consider the Hawaiian quilt block design possibilities!

Above all, have fun!

Guidelines:

1. You may choose **any size block** as small as 4 inches square (finished), up to 16 inches square (finished) as long as the finished size is divisible by two (4x4, 6x6, 8x8, etc.). Don't forget to build in your seam allowances—the working block would be one-half inch bigger than the finished block.
2. All blocks must have **black borders** – preferably at least one inch wide. If you use a pattern with a background, make that background color black as well. The border and background can be pure black, or black-on-black fabric.
3. **No large or busy prints** – think Batiks, Bali prints, brights, tone-on-tone, jewel tones, primary colors, whatever you think will look great.
4. **No other SHAPE** should be in the block for the month. But any block that features the shape-of-the-month will be just fine!
