On November 12, 2009, we will welcome National Award winning machine quilter Jill Schumacher to our guild. She will be speaking about *Creating Your Heirlooms of Tomorrow*. She began quilting at the age of 12, was an art major in college, and began machine quilting in 1997. Her first machine quilted quilt won first prize at the Siskiyou County Fair the next year and then took second at the State level. This began her journey in the world of quilting, which has also included her quilting business, *Quiltmaker to the Queen* (www.quiltmakertotheking.com)

Jill has quilted over 475 quilts in the last 10 years for both herself and customers. She has won numerous awards including national awards at AQS in Paducah, KY, and Best Machine Award at NQA and PIQF. Jill's Flower Girl Quilt traveled to the Japan Quilt Expo with all of the AQS winners from 2001.

Please join us at the general meeting on November 12 to enjoy a trunk show and many words of wisdom from an energetic and very fun quilter.

A Barn-Raising Takes a Community

Recently I caught a glimpse into our not-so-distant past while watching the movie *Witness*, a 1985 film starring Harrison Ford and Kelly McGillis. While the movie's premise was somewhat predictable, a majority of the film's action purportedly takes place in a rural Amish community in Pennsylvania.

While it should be noted that many of the "extras" in the film were actually Mennonites (true Amish do not permit their likenesses to be photographed), there were some fine cinematic scenes shot in the farming community to depict daily "Amish" life. One, in particular, was a fairly lengthy sequence depicting a barn-raising for the benefit of one of the members of their community.

The scene began with members of the community driving their wagons laden with tools, family and workers to the site where the barn was to be raised. While it is generally the responsibility of the barn recipients to provide ALL of the food for the workers, all of the women and young girls set about the task of gathering a vast collection of food to feed everyone, while the men and young boys began the task of constructing the huge barn. The barn site's foundation had been prepared in advance so that the collection of workers, both skilled and those providing "man-power" could attend to the actual "build". The raising was truly a collaborative effort, with the framework soon rising into the sky and workers balancing themselves on lofty perches to drive home the wooden pegs to hold the huge beams in place. Miraculously, it seemed, the barn sprang to life out of the pile of wood.

Later in the film, when the family is in dire need of assistance to thwart an attack from outsiders, the young boy rings a huge bell hung outside their home. Their neighbors drop whatever they are doing and rush to their aid across the open fields.

As I watched these scenes unfold in the film, I felt a kinship with those of my ancestors who came to America from the Black Sea region known as Romania and the Ukraine, German farming immigrants who settled in the plains of the Dakotas. Life there was harsh in the early 1800's, but it was not unlike the land from which they had come. They were dependent upon each other for strength and survival, and to them, COMMUNITY was EVERYTHING.

When the film ended, I paused to reflect on how that feeling of community plays a role in MY life, living today in such a beautiful corner of the world, far away from my own "kith and kin". It was then that I realized how much the Guild has become a "community" for me... and how the tangle of preparations for our upcoming quilt show next fall is unfolding just like a "barn-raising".

The construction of a beautiful quilt show requires LOTS of preparation long before the visual scene appears: Formulating a "blue print", building a strong foundation, and then gathering the WHOLE community to erect the framework and put on the finishing touches. The show committees need EVERYONE'S HELP, so please consider offering your expertise while preparations are under way.

And when the bell rings, we are depending on ALL of you to answer the call!



Block of the Month for December




O' CHRISTMAS TREE


Block of the Month - December 2009

December is tree decorating time! The sixth installment in our "Quilted Calendar" Block of the Month is a Christmas tree that's just waiting for your own special embellishments. Decorate one for Guild and don't forget to decorate a spare for your own Quilted Calendar!

FABRIC:



GOLD -
Cut one 1 7/8" square (M)
Cut two 2 3/8" squares (O)



GREEN -
Cut one 2 1/2" x 10 1/2" rectangle (C)
Cut one 2 1/2" x 8 1/2" rectangle (E)
Cut one 2 1/2" x 6 1/2" rectangle (G)
Cut one 2 1/2" x 4 1/2" rectangle (I)



BROWN -
Cut one 2" x 2 1/2" rectangle (A)



NEUTRAL -
Cut two 2 1/2" x 5 3/4" rectangles (B)
Cut two 2 1/2" x 3 5/8" rectangles (D)
Cut two 2 1/2" x 4 5/8" rectangles (F)
Cut two 2 1/2" x 5 5/8" rectangles (H)
Cut one 2 1/2" x 6 5/8" rectangle (J)
Cut one 2 1/2" square (K)
Cut one 2 1/2" x 8 1/2" rectangle (L)
Cut four 1 7/8" squares (N)
Cut two 2 3/8" squares (P)

ASSEMBLY:

STAR -

Create the (O-P) half-square triangle ("HST") units by drawing a diagonal line on the wrong side of the (P) squares. With the (O-P) squares right sides together, stitch 1/4" from both sides of diagonal line. Cut apart on drawn line, press. Trim to 1 7/8" square.

Using the remaining (M) & (N) squares, complete the star as indicated. Unit should measure 4 1/2" square.

TREE -

Make the trunk strip by sewing the (A) & (B) rectangles together as indicated.

Make the (C-D) tree strip by laying the strips perpendicular to each other, right sides together and outer edges even, stitch across at a diagonal (similar to a binding strip) - be sure to check placement of strips. Trim and press to green. This strip may be a tiny bit long, if so, simply trim to 12 1/2" (quick trim: fold in half lengthwise, aligning seams and trim 6 1/4" from fold). Make the (E-F) & (G-H) strips in a similar manner.

Sew the (J-I-K) strip similar to the other tree strips but, if needed, trim this strip to 8 1/2" - trim away on the (J) side.

Complete the remainder of the block as shown, block should measure 12 1/2" square.

Holiday Donation

The Guild is inviting members to donate a new pair or package of socks and/or underwear to the Women's Free Health Clinic at our November or December Guild meetings. The WFHC is for homeless women who sleep at one of the shelters in town or live on the streets. The clinic was started by Dr. Mimi Doohan, a local physician who was homeless herself as a child. It meets at Transition House every other Friday morning from 9 am to 1 pm and provides services performed by doctors, nurses, social worker, and Planned Parenthood. The women can take showers and wash their clothes. They receive a donation of new socks and underwear, toiletries, a warm meal, and have a safe, warm place to relax for the morning. About 20 women ranging in age from about 18 to mid-60's attend each clinic, and there are some regulars who have attended since the clinic opened last December. The WFHC very much needs new underwear and socks of all sizes, so please remember this as you begin your holiday shopping. There will be a donation box near the sign-in desk at the November and December Guild meetings.
