

Choosing Colors As Easy As 1-2-3!

Don't you just love walking through quilts shows, marveling at the creativity of so many people who so obviously LOVE quilts and quilting? There are always "certain ones" that tend to stop you in your tracks, begging for a closer look... and many times these are ones with dramatic or exceptionally fine use of color.

How did they guilter choose a color palate? You may be surprised to learn that not all of those guilters have a background in art or color theory. While many of them may use a color wheel to determine their color choices -- a tool that may leave some quilters weak in the knees at the thought of using one – it can be much simpler than you think!

Here is a quick and easy way to accomplish your goal: First select a multicolored print fabric that you just simply LOVE! Take a look at the selvage edge of the fabric and find the row of numbered colored dots. These are called the "dye markers" and each dot represents a certain color in the print. To select coordinating fabric colors, find ones that match these dots. You are always assured that the colors you've selected will automatically coordinate, because they're already in the fabric you love!

If you don't have what you need in your fabric "stash", cut off a piece of the selvage containing the dots and take THAT with you when you shop, so you'll know exactly what to look for.

How easy is that? As easy as 1-2-3!

Harvest of Colors Judging Categories

We are excited to announce that this Show's award winning entries will be distinguished with custom made fabric ribbons created by Joann Conklin. Respecting this generous contribution of her time, we will limit judged categories to seven. This year we will be introducing a Wearable Art category for the first time.

Our New Quilter category is also a priority. We encourage quilters who have been quilting for less than three years to not only enter the show, but to submit their entry for judging. All new quilters' entries will be judged as a group, regardless of technique. We look forward to seeing fresh perspective and styles that new quilters have to offer! This category is reserved so that you will not be in direct competition with more experienced quilters. If you are intimidated by the idea of having your quilt judged, remember that it is a wonderful chance for all quilters to get professional feedback and improve their quilt-making skills.

That leaves five categories to be created for Traditional, Innovative and Art. The three factors that determine the final placing of an entry into its category are size; technique-pieced, appliquéd, mixed- by hand or machine; and whether it is quilted by hand, by machine by the same person who pieced the top, or commercially quilted. Commercially quilted entries are considered two-person quilts, but will not be a separate category. The final categories and placements will be determined right after the entry deadline. The Judge and judging committee may move entries that have already been recieved to the most appropriate category. Each category will require a minimum of five entries.

I hope this clarifies why the categories on the Show Entry Form were listed differently than in the past. Finally, remember that the name you assign your entry is the only information the Judge hears before she sees your quilt - so catch her interest from the start!

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Quilt Show News

Summer is the time for moving full-force ahead with our Quilt Show plans – and everything is going well. We hope you are all preparing your quilts and telling your friends about our upcoming show. Word-of-mouth is our very best advertising.

Tickets

Remember that we are pre-selling tickets for \$8.00; they will be \$10 at the door. Liz Turner will be at the next few Guild meetings selling tickets, with the September meeting being the last opportunity to buy advance tickets. We have decided that, in order to encourage youth in our community, we will not be charging for ages 18 and under! So bring your daughters and granddaughters, sons and grandsons!

Also remember that you can earn your ticket by volunteering to help with the show. However, because this is a major fund-raiser for the Guild and it allows us to have wonderful speakers and workshops, we hope that you will consider buying your ticket, even after volunteering. Please remember to sell tickets to your friends, relatives, co-workers, neighbors and anyone else you can think of.

Volunteers

Diane Eardley and Wanda Livernois will have the volunteer sign-up folders available at Guild meetings and there are plenty of spaces left to fill. There are also opportunities to help that are not included on the sign-up folders. In particular, we will need help with our "blanket the town" displays. We are currently scheduled to have the display case at the Goleta Library for the month of September and will need help with preparing a display. I know we have creative individuals (or groups) who will be willing to facilitate this display. We will also have a display in the children's area of the Downtown Library. I'd like to acknowledge a few satellite groups that are going above and beyond the call of duty in helping our show. As mentioned above, a few are making things for the boutique. The Sewfisticats are making adorable purses (that are already selling as fast as they can make them), the Sew-Whats are making table runners, and the SewItAlls are making hot pads. When you walk into the show in September, you will notice lots of new fabric signs for the various areas and rows – all made for us by the Loose Threads. (You may recall that these ladies were responsible for making the bags for our last show). Thank you all for the work you are putting in to making our show pretty and successful.

Making a Quilt Sleeve

I'd like to share a method, which works for me.

- After your quilt is bound, cut a 9" strip of fabric the width of the quilt.
- 2. Narrowly hem the side edges of the sleeve by folding each edge twice, press, and stitch close to the inner fold.
- 3. Next, fold the sleeve fabric lengthwise, wrong sides together, and press the fold. This creates a lengthwise guideline down the center of the sleeve.
- Open the sleeve. Still with wrong sides together, bring one long edge to this center-line fold to create a new fold, press. This will become the hand-sewing guideline for the top edge of the sleeve.
- 5. Keeping the wrong sides together bring the two unfinished edges together, pin, sew a ¼" seam along the length of the sleeve. Press this seam to one side, being careful not to eliminate the sleeve's new top edge hand-sewing guideline.
- 6. Press out the center-line fold.
- 7. With the sleeve seam against the back of the quilt use the pressed hand-sewing guideline to pin the sleeve ½" from the top of the quilt. Securely blind stitch the top edge of the sleeve to the back of the quilt along the guideline, remove pins as you work. Avoid penetrating your stitches to the front of the quilt.
- 8. Now carefully manipulate the sleeve fabric up to the quilt's top edge from your just stitched top edge of the sleeve. Create a fold parallel to the quilt's top edge. Pin this new fold in place. It will provide just enough ease in the sleeve to accommodate a standard hanging rod.
- Keeping the top edge pinned, smooth down the remaining sleeve fabric until it is flattened against the quilt back, forming a lower fold. Pin this fold in place to the quilt back.
- 10. Now remove the pins from the top edge of the quilt, releasing the rod ease, so that you can handle the quilt as you blind stitch this lower sleeve fold to the quilt back, remove pins as you work.
- 11. I also blind stitch the sides of the "back" of the sleeve to the back of the quilt hiding the sleeve's seam allowance for a neat finish. When the rod is slipped through the sleeve it won't accidentally slide between the backside of the sleeve and the back of the quilt.
- 12. Check that no blind stitches show through the front of the quilt. Finished!


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Block of the Month for July

SCRAP INSANITY

Introducing the Block of the Month for 2010-2011

Block of the Month 2010-2011 is all about scraps. Big scraps, little scraps, cute scraps, plain scraps, fancy scraps, even ugly scraps. We are going to help you use up those scraps. Many of the blocks we have chosen this year will form secondary patterns as they are assembled.



There are only two rules for this BOM series.

- The background fabrics will vary from month to month between white, cream, and black. For example: if a block calls for white background, then all the background pieces must be white (or white on white prints). They may be the same fabric or different fabrics as long as they match the color specified in the instructions.
- The scrap fabrics within each block must be different. There shouldn't be any two pieces in your completed block that match. If the block has 8 pieces that are lights, mediums or darks, you will use 8 different fabrics.

FIESTA PINWHEELS

The second installment of Scrap Insanity is Pinwheels. This month we are honoring Fiesta so it's time to dig out those bright happy scraps – 16 of them to be precise

FABRIC:



Background: white. Cut 16 squares 4".



Scraps: you will need 16 different fabrics. This block will look best using a variety of medium and dark fabrics. Cut 16 squares 4".

ASSEMBLY:

Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of all the background pieces.

Match a background piece and a scrap with right sides together. Stitch $\frac{1}{4}$ " from both sides of the diagonal line. Cut apart on the drawn line. Press seams toward the scrap. Trim to 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ " by 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ ".

Layout the half square triangle (HST) units as shown in the diagram and complete your block. Block should measure 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ " square.

Note: If you follow this method, you will be able to make two blocks. Or, save the left over HST units for a future Block of the Month.
