Challenge 2011:

"All Creatures Great and Small"

Those of you who have been busy completing your entries for our Harvest of Colors Quilt Show are now free to contemplate how to delight guild members and guests when the Challenge 2011 is presented in March. That's the fun of the Challenge, the surprises of how the Challenge concept is met, developed and executed. I can't wait to see the results. With few rules you have a generous opportunity to be creative. You may choose to represent a creature either through the required animal print fabric, by use of multiple fabrics or not. Your required animal print may be but a slight detail in an otherwise non-creature project. Great or Small, each members entry is acceptable as long as two criteria are met.

1. INCLUDE at least ONE IDENTIFIABLE (non-human) ANIMAL OR ANIMAL FEATURE PRINT fabric.
2. ANY HANDMADE CREATION which includes SOME QUILTING is acceptable. Wall hangings are restricted to a circumference of 120". You may incorporate into your entry a toy (doll or stuffed animal) which you made prior to the announcement of Challenge 2011 as long as the toy sports a new handmade creation which adheres to Challenge 2011's rules.

I've got my idea. I've started my fabric search. I'll begin my entry soon. I find challenges help me reach my goals, one of which is time to quilt. Happy Quilting.

Community Quilts Project

We begin this new year with a big thank you for supporting not only the Community Quilts Project, but so many other efforts. You use your individual talents and time to help meet the many needs of our local community by donating to silent auctions, boutiques, and the Linus Project, and by making gowns and bags for cancer patients...the list is endless.

In response to the many suggestions about whom and what age groups to support this year, we have selected four different recipients. Hopefully, one will speak to you. They are as follows:

Santa Barbara Assistance League's Fostering Friends Project-We will continue working with this project in their efforts to assist young adults transitioning upon graduation from foster care assistance to emancipated minors. We anticipate needing 20-25 quilts.

California Department of Veterans Affairs-The Southern California Council of Quilt Guilds have asked the member organizations to contribute 4-5 quilts both twin bed or lap size. The new care center is located in Los Angeles and is focused on assisted care, skilled nursing care and Alzheimer care. This request is for on-going assistance as the center plans to grow to 300 beds.

Santa Barbara Neighborhood Clinics- The clinics work with our local low income communities to provide both medical and dental care. They primarily rely on some insurance reimbursements including MediCal, state and federal grants, as well as donors for their operating budget. The clinics are located on Eastside (Milpas), the Westside (Micheltorena) and in Isla Vista (Embarcadero Loop). The Community Quilts Project's goal is to bring some joy to their young patients. Our quilts will be distributed by the Pediatricians. The targeted age groups for the quilts are infants to 10 years old.

Unity- For those seeking a smaller and quick project, we've earmarked the November Guild meeting for Unity. As you know, they work with low income families giving them an opportunity to shop for gifts for their children with dignity. Some suggestions for your consideration are children's quilts, a doll quilt, Christmas stockings, a Hanukkah gift or any other Holiday celebration items and knitted hats. Anything that you wish to offer would be most appreciated by these families.

In terms of supplies, the Community Quilts Project will continue to provide quilt kits, batting, and backing fabric. If you need a particular size batting, please email us or call our cell phone numbers. We are still looking forward to hosting a Saturday coffee in late Fall. Come at this time and find that perfect backing fabric.

We are looking forward to another rewarding year. KEEP QUILTING!!!!

The Loose Threads satellite group began around 2003 (no one really remembers the exact date!). When Norah McMeeking put out a call for anyone who was interested to come to a meeting, Cynthia Manzer volunteered her home for the meeting. When Norah couldn't make it, Cynthia became the organizer of the group. Many of the members came from the former "wearable arts" group that had met with Barbara Greenleaf. A few more members joined and the group was off and running!

The "Loosies" take turns hosting their meeting in the morning on the 4th Tuesday of the month. The current membership includes Barbara Aspen, Susan Carty, Ky Easton, Heather Georgakis, Diane Haley, Paulette Ley, Nancy Lietz, Cynthia Manzer, Jean McCaffrey, Judy McCartney, Juli Shulem, and Ing Welker. Former members are Barbara Franklin (who relocated to Seattle, WA) and Layla Khashoggi. Their December meeting is traditionally an evening holiday potluck, inviting their husbands (whom they affectionately call the "Loose Screws" -- for their woodworking abilities!) or significant others.

Over the years they have enjoyed the food and company immensely, and more than one member has been heard to say that these meetings take the place of expensive therapy sessions! Their meetings last for about two hours, sharing what has been happening in their quilting as well as "outside" lives. They are all in agreement: Joining this satellite group was the best idea in the world. The friendships made are important parts of their lives, and they always know they can count on their "Loose" friends!

Block of the Month for November

SCRAP INSANITY: SPOOLS

Have you ever been in the middle of a project and run out of thread? These pretty spools won't really help with that problem, but they will be fun to make.

There are 36 pieces to this block and it will finish to 12 1/2" square.


FABRIC:



Background: white or cream.



Scraps: you will need 4 different fabrics for the 'thread' and 4 different fabrics for the spools. Use your 4 lightest scraps for the thread on your block. As an added challenge, try to coordinate the thread color with the color of the spool.



FROM YOUR SCRAPS:

Cut 4 pieces 3 1/2" square for the 'thread'.
Cut 8 pieces 6 1/2" x 2" for the spools (4 sets of 2 matching).

FROM YOUR BACKGROUND:

Cut 8 pieces 3 1/2" x 2"
Cut 16 pieces 2" square

ASSEMBLY:

To make the spool ends: Mark a diagonal line from corner to corner on the back side of the 2" background piece. Place piece, right sides together, on the spool fabric lining up the edges of the fabric. Stitch on the diagonal line. Trim seam to 1/4". Repeat on the other end of the spool fabric. NOTE: make two identical spool ends for each quarter of the block.

For the thread: sew a 3 1/2" x 2" piece of background fabric to opposite sides of the thread fabric.

Assemble each quarter block in rows with a spool end, thread, and a spool end, making sure the spool ends line up correctly with the thread. Make four 'spools' and assemble as shown in the diagram.

Quilt Show Judging Notes

I want to thank those members who submitted entries for judging for the Harvest of Colors Quilt Show.

An impressive total of 39% of the entries entered in the show were submitted to be judged. Many of these will be honored with lovely award ribbons. All of the quiltmakers will be presented with a Judge Evaluation Sheet which compliments their efforts while supporting continued improvement.

I found it interesting how the 89 entries were distributed into the eleven categories to be presented to the Judges on Judging Day. Their placement depended on various factors. A breakdown follows:

- by size - large 33%, small 53%;
- by style - traditional 51%, art 35%;
- by technique - pieced 42%, appliqué 10%, appliqué / mixed 28%; Large Art in a self contained category 6%;
- how quilted? - by hand 10%, self quilted by machine 60%, commercially quilted 29%, and a combination of hand quilted, commercially quilted 1%.
- The "New Quilters" and Wearables categories were each 7% of the total entries submitted for judging. Since they were self contained categories they weren't broken down further by size, style or technique.

Innovative entries must show quite a dramatic uniqueness. This year all entries fit into traditional or art categories.

As I write this, Judging Day is still on the calendar, and entries are being collected with one week until Show Time! I'm sure the 2010 Harvest of Colors will be a show to be proud of. See you there.

An Update: Thanks for "Planting Your Votes"

Under the Dreyer's "Communities Take Root" program this summer, in conjunction with The Fruit Tree Planting Foundation (FTPF), twenty-five communities throughout the United States won orchards for places like public parks, food banks, and community gardens and centers, including our own Alpha Resource Center here in Santa Barbara! Stop by their location on Cathedral Oaks Road and see their beautiful new orchard.

"The Fruit Tree Planting Foundation (FTPF) is an award-winning international nonprofit charity dedicated to planting fruitful trees and plants to alleviate world hunger, combat global warming, strengthen communities, and improve the surrounding air, soil, and water. Recipients must be nonprofits, public schools, or government entities that 1) own the planting site (or have long-term arrangements to remain at the planting site), 2) are committed to caring for the trees in perpetuity, 3) have a source of irrigation nearby, 4) and can help coordinate local volunteers to join us on the day of planting."

The FTPF is now busy planting trees to provide generations of communities with nutritional and environmental benefits. They are currently accepting the first 125 qualified applications for the next round of the program, so if you know of an organization who may benefit from this program, have them download and submit an application: <http://www.ftpf.org/application.doc>
