The Knotty Threads satellite group formed as a result of Susan Davies and Nola Ferguson thinking it would be a great idea to gather all of the Carpinteria quilters for some local fun and sharing. They phoned every Coastal Quilt Guild member living in Carpinteria and got an enthusiastic "YES!" from 18 women who are very grateful to Sue and Nola for bringing them together. Although it has been a relatively short time since they formed as a satellite group, they have already made some cherished friendships. Their first meeting in January 2010 was held at Nola's house, and since then they have met at the homes of other members. "It's exciting to see where everyone quilts — an inspiration in itself!" says member Roxanne Barbieri.

Members of The Knotty Threads are all types of quilters: beginners, experienced, traditional, and modern. They work on a variety of projects,

ranging from king-sized to baby quilts, art quilts to gifty things, tote bags to wool quilts. Everyone brings their own projects to share and work on at meetings. They enjoy learning new techniques from each other and are inspired to try things beyond their comfort zone. Each group member is attempting to make a block for their hostesses, so eventually each member will have a block of their own choosing from each of the other members. What a novel way for everyone to have a special keepsake of their wonderful shared experiences!

This year one of their unique adventures was a members' retreat at Roxanne Barbieri's home on Catalina Island, working on a special project they titled "Fishful Thinking." Eleven members participated in the four-day retreat and everyone had a fabulous time. Not only did they create some amazing projects, learned a lot, and had immeasurable fun, but they also got the chance to really get to know each other — and the bonds of their friendship have grown even stronger. They later shared their retreat project with the remaining members of the group, planning to present a mini showing of their completed works, of which they are very excited and proud!

Their group's goal is "to promote and encourage the art of quilting and to get to know and appreciate each other better." No activity in the group is mandatory, so each may choose to participate in a special project or not; all members are accepted for their own contribution to the group. Much can be learned from everyone, and their creativity is endless. They are inspired by Marilyn Seigel and Kay Naumann, their "perfectionists" Carol Hart and Dorothy Oksner (who knits socks, too!), Becky Gallup (who makes them laugh — a LOT!), Kika Hutchings who, as they all know, has the perfect smile and lipstick (wherever does she get it?), Nola with her wonderful wool projects, and the list goes on.

A Dog's Purpose

From a 6-year-old's point of view, as related by a veterinarian

Being a veterinarian, I had been called to examine a 10-year-old Irish Wolfhound named Belker. The dog's owners, Ron, his wife Lisa, and their little boy Shane, were all very attached to Belker, and they were hoping for a miracle.

I examined Belker and found he was dying of cancer. I told the family we couldn't do anything for Belker, and offered to perform the euthanasia procedure for the old dog in their home. As we made arrangements, Ron and Lisa told me they thought it would be good for six-year-old Shane to observe the procedure. They felt as though Shane might learn something from the experience.

The next day, I felt the familiar catch in my throat as Belker's family surrounded him. Shane seemed so calm, petting the old dog for the last time, that I wondered if he understood what was going on. Within a few minutes, Belker slipped peacefully away.

The little boy seemed to accept Belker's transition without any difficulty or confusion. We sat together for a while after Belker's death, wondering aloud about the sad fact that animal lives are shorter than human lives. Shane, who had been listening quietly, piped up, "I know why."

Startled, we all turned to him. What came out of his mouth next stunned me — I'd never heard a more comforting explanation. It has changed the way I try and live.

He said, "People are born so that they can learn how to live a good life — like loving everybody all the time and being nice, right?" The six-year-old continued, "Well, dogs already know how to do that, so they don't have to stay as long."

The truths are easy to remember: Live simply. Love generously. Care deeply. Speak kindly.

Remember, if a dog was the teacher, you would learn things like:

- When loved ones come home, always run to greet them.
- Never pass up the opportunity to go for a joyride.
- Allow the experience of fresh air and the wind in your face to be pure ECSTASY.
- Take naps.
- Stretch before rising.
- Run, romp, and play daily.
- Thrive on attention and let people touch you.
- Avoid biting when a simple growl will do.
- On warm days, stop to lie on your back on the grass.
- On hot days, drink lots of water and lie under a shady tree.
- When you're happy, dance around and wag your entire body.
- Delight in the simple joy of a long walk.
- Be loyal.
- Never pretend to be something you're not.
- If what you want lies buried, dig until you find it.
- When someone is having a bad day, be silent, sit close by, and nuzzle them gently.



Block of the Month

KEEP IT SCRAPPY: AUTUMN CALICO PUZZLE

Fall is in the air and time to bring out those fall scrap fabrics! This month's block is made up of the basics: squares, half square triangles and four-patches. Simple to piece but what a lovely fall quilt it will make for the winner!



FABRIC:



Background: Background: You will need a variety of whites.



Scraps: You will need 10 different scraps of dark fabric.



Solid black

CUTTING:

- From background fabric: Cut 4 squares 4 7/8"
- From scraps: Cut 1 square 4 1/2"; 4 squares 4 7/8"; and 8 squares 2 1/2"
- From black: Cut 8 squares 2 1/2"

ASSEMBLY:

- Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of the 4 7/8" background squares.
- Match these squares with the 4 7/8" scrap squares right sides together.
- Stitch 1/4" from both sides of the diagonal line.
- Cut apart on the diagonal line. Press and trim to 4 1/2".
- Sew 2 black squares and 2 scrap squares to create a four-patch. Press and trim to 4 1/2".
- Make 3 more four-patches in the same way.
- Lay out the squares as shown in the diagram and piece together. Press.

Your block should now be 12 1/2" square. Any leftover half square triangles may be saved for future blocks or you could use them to make two blocks.

This Year's Keep It Scrappy Rules

1. The background fabrics will either be white or perhaps a combination of white and cream.
2. As last year, the scrap fabrics within each block must be different. If the pattern calls for 8 dark or medium pieces, you should use 8 different dark or medium scraps.
