

March Meeting: Dana Jones, "Pagtinabangay: The Quilts and Quiltmakers of Caohagan Island"

Dana Jones is not only a quilt maker and designer, but also an accomplished journalist, editor, researcher, and author. She spent time in the Philippines researching a group of people there that create art quilts that aid in their survival. Her talk is entitled: "Pagtinabangay: The Quilts and Quiltmakers of Caohagan Island", and will tell us their story and show us their art. Since authoring the book, Dana has been on the road sharing their story. Other hats Dana has worn include being the editor of Quilter's Newsletter and



the SAQA Journal, lecturing to guilds and teaching workshops. We are in for a fascinating and informative evening as we hear from Dana Jones.

If you can sew following a straight line, you can be a success at paper piecing. We have a small group taking this workshop and there will be time for the teacher to provide individual help. As I look over the supply list, I see the birds are made up of four colors and only one fat quarter and 3 fat eights are needed for each crane. It would be easy to pick the fabric from your stash. The crane's light-colored torso with your favorite

fabric on its wings would look great. Sign up today and vandalize your stash to make a unique quilt. The cost is \$50.00 and there is a \$25.00 fee payable to the teacher for her supplies.

Textile Recycling Program

MarBorg Industries is re-launching its Textile Recovery Drop-off Program beginning on Friday, February 14, at the Goleta Recycling Center. This program aims to reduce textile waste and promote sustainable practices within our community.

Challenge 2025 - Idioms, Adages, Familiar Sayings

No words on the block, the image must "tell the story." Examples:

- As alike as two peas in a pod.
- The light at the end of the tunnel.
- Birds of a feather.
- Like father, like son.
- To wear your heart on your sleeve.
- Born with a silver spoon in your mouth.
- Pushing up daisies.
- Good weather for ducks.
- To make a mountain out of a molehill.
- Cat got your tongue?
- It's a piece of cake.

Due at May 2025 meeting, to be revealed at June meeting with voting by the membership according to the following criteria:

- Best Interpretation (that is "yup, you got it").
- Most amusing interpretation ("that's tooooooo funny").
- Most obscure ("a real head scratcher but in the end, hits it squarely on the nail head").

For this Challenge, the Co-Chairs encourage participants to donate their blocks for use in quilts given to Community Projects. The options are:

- 1. Judged, **Not** Donated: Size 15" square finished.
- 2. Judged, Donated: 12.5" square <u>unfinished</u> size (following the above rules).
- Unjudged, Donated: 12.5" square <u>unfinished</u> size (need *not* follow above Challenge rules).

Isabel will assemble the <u>donated</u> blocks, judged and unjudged, for donation to Community Projects and is also making unfinished blocks to assemble into a quilt using Option 3. Questions? Contact us!

Tips & Techniques

When burying threads in your quilt top, have you ever tried the "lasso/loop" technique using dental floss? It's similar to that using a needle and a knotted thread/loop but you don't have to deal with a knot or thread!

Using, preferably new, dental floss, bend the floss in half, forming a loop, then thread it through the eye of a sewing needle and bring it to one side. Size of the loop and needle is to your preference. Place the point of the needle at the base of the threads to be buried in the quilt top, place the thread tails through the floss loop, then feed the tip of the needle a short distance away from the entry point and pull the tails and floss all the way through the fabric. Pull taut, snip the thread tails. Smooth. Using the "loop" doesn't require a knot and the dental floss is stronger than thread and doesn't break as easily. Here's a video on Facebook demonstrating this technique. Bernina also demonstrates the technique using thread.

Daylesford Sew-Along

Last month we had quite a bit of piecing. To compensate, we only added three new logs. This month, there is no piecing (unless you choose to add some!), so we're going to add a whopping <u>six</u> more logs! Next month is going to be far fewer additions, but does include the dreaded teeny tiny Churn Dash blocks...


March's Sew-Along

After row 23, your <u>unfinished</u> quilt should measure $37\frac{1}{2} \times 43\frac{1}{2}$ ". Remember, the diagram shows the FINISHED dimensions of each row, so be sure to add $\frac{1}{2}$ " seam allowance when cutting out. I have forgotten this twice already myself and it's very annoying!

Obviously we are now heading into territory where the log lengths are beyond the standard 42-44" WOF. This applies to some of this month's logs and almost always from now on.

Exactly how you piece these longer lengths is entirely up to you! In her book, Jen splits logs into two or three shorter lengths, and sometimes uses two narrower strips for one of these sections. Do look in her book or at pictures online for inspiration based on what others have done before!

This is really your time to personalise! Maybe even add some small pieced blocks - a few more flying geese, on more point squares or even a star or two...
