She will discuss color contrast, balance, focal point and other important color principles in her presentation. President's Message

As this Guild year winds down, and as I think about

what to write for my final annual report, I decided to mention some issues about this past year that highlight what went wonderfully well and some that need to be reconsidered. Or, at least this is my opinion. I am immensely



proud of a few programs and initiatives that were well planned and executed.

- We had a fabulous quilt show last October led by Nancy Butterfield and Ranell Hansen. Hats off to these ladies who changed the show admission price, tweaked the quilt submission form and presented a special exhibit that had a universal appeal to quilters and the public alike. Many members volunteered, AND it made a profit. Yippee.
- We are successfully using online forms to sign up for, and collect credit card payments for, workshops, the bus trip, quilt judging and sew days. Thank you to Sue Kadner who worked her magic to create the technical pathway to make this possible. Next we will be setting up an online membership form to collect dues and donations.
- We had a fun bus trip to Road to California (with wine) and if you missed this one I hope you will be excited to join in for a future trip.
- A new satellite group was born, meeting in the evening and wrapping some newer members into the Guild fold.
- Our Board members and Committee Chairs served with enthusiasm and commitment. They attended meetings, stuck with us for a second or fourth year and kept the wheels turning.
- We continued offering hybrid general meetings, with the aid of Eric, the AV technician at Live Oak UUC. He is a gracious gentleman with the technical know how to provide an interactive meeting as opposed to a video presentation.

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- We had some well attended parties, which are so necessary to maintain old friendships and nurture new ones.
- The Guild presented a group sew variation on the former Block of the Month activity. I saw many hands raised at our last meeting, so I know that many of you decided to participate in this project. Thank you, Bee Saunders, for identifying a quilt design that would appeal to members with varying skills.

I would be remiss if I didn't mention some areas that I believe warrant some discussion going forward.

- Money. Prices are going up for storage lockers, meeting spaces, hotel rooms and travel fees for speakers, insurance and Air Bus rental. I know that you understand this intellectually, but in reality, you vote with your participation by renewing your Guild membership and paying for workshops. Thank goodness our quilt show made a profit and the April fabric sale will be a source of funds from inventory that we get as donations. Without holding a fabric sale every year, we would be deficit spending to the point of concern.
- Participation. I watch the numbers every month, and I know that attending by Zoom is a fantastic convenience. However, pre-Covid, I remember Guild meetings averaging about 65 members attended in-person. To pull off our ambitious list of programs, challenges and contests we need flesh and blood warm bodies filling the ranks.
- Seeing as how you love the three choices for the door prize raffle, I think we would sell more tickets for an Opportunity Quilt if we offered three smaller quilts. I think that the extra work to haul them around and hang them at meetings would be offset by the wider appeal.

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
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- If we are holding on to the hope that our workshops will financially cover their costs, we need to boost participation OR increase workshop fees.
- This is a big one. After two years of setting up tables in the Live Oak sanctuary, I feel that the space is smaller than ideal for the many activities that happen at our general meetings. Refreshments are not that important, but there would be more use of our library, visits to the treasure table, door prize and opportunity quilt tickets sold, and general visiting between members, if we had the space. In a perfect world we could pack up Eric and his equipment and move to a larger room, but of course that is not possible. The next Board will have to determine how to navigate this problem, because I do believe it impacts participation at the general meetings.

I hear from speakers who present at our Guild that Coastal Quilters is a vibrant group with membership numbers that demonstrate we have much to offer quilters in our area. This is a compliment to all who have built and staff this framework and I want to be sure that we continue to do so.

Challenge 2025 Update - Idioms, Adages, Familiar Sayings

To submit block(s) that will be incorporated into a community quilt, all you need to do is fill out a small card with your name and the title of the block (that is the adage pictured), safety pin it to the block, roll up the block and turn it in to Isabel or Melinda at the May meeting. If you choose to make a quilt that you want to keep, the label on the back with your name and the adage is sufficient, then roll it up to conceal the label. If you are not able to attend the meeting in person, please mail the block to Isabel, 3860 Sunset Rd, Santa Barbara, CA 93110, including a stamped addressed return envelope.

On *judgment day*, aka the June meeting, the entries will be exhibited with only an identifying number. All members are eligible to vote; a mechanism is being developed for those on Zoom to vote. Members will judge the entries according to the following criteria:

- Best Interpretation of its adage (that is "yup, you got it").
- Most amusing interpretation ("that's tooooooo funny").
- Most obscure ("a real head scratcher that maybe you figured out").

Prizes will be awarded to the winners as well as the other participants.

Marty's daughter, Melissa, crocheted 4 blankets for the cradle sets which were completed by her mom. We also received at the Guild meeting one cradle set donated by a member whose name is unknown. Two PHDs were taken from the Community Projects table. Thank you to the members who took them.

There was one donated PHD and Michelle took it home, using one of the squares to make a heart pillow that was given to her daughter, a nurse at the Cottage Hospital Cardiac ICU, to give to a patient. 

Daylesford Sew-Along


Phew! Those tiny Churn Dash blocks, or whatever you chose to put in their place, are done! Our quilt tops are now about 50" square and we've only got about three more rotations to go. We're getting close to the finish line now! This month we're adding five more logs, only one of which is pieced. If you've set aside scraps along the way, the piano keys should go together quickly. This is our penultimate lot of instructions, with the final six logs coming next month.


We're going to do a progress display of our work at May's meeting, so bring along your quilt top, whether it's already finished, or very much a work in progress....

May's Sew-Along

After row 31, your <u>unfinished quilt should measure $49\frac{1}{2}$ x $54\frac{1}{2}$ ". Remember, the diagram shows the FINISHED dimensions of each row, so be sure to add $\frac{1}{2}$ " seam allowance when cutting out. I have forgotten before and it's very annoying!</u>

Log 32 is a strip or piano key border of FINISHED width 4". Jen uses 39 strips, but you can use as many or few as you like. Use strip sets if you want a repeating pattern, or pick pieces out of a paper bag for a truly random approach!





Piano key border - cutting and piecing

Cut each strip at $1\frac{1}{2}$ x $4\frac{1}{2}$ " and stitch down the long edge. You may prefer to cut them longer and trim to an accurate $4\frac{1}{2}$ " once they're all pieced. Continue for the full $59\frac{1}{2}$ " or make up the extra with a single larger piece.
